It is rather ironic that John's death should have occurred at the start of the Edinbugh Fringe. He loved this event and for years, until failing health prevented it, he would plan in minute detail a two week stay in Edinburgh to pack in attending as many performances of all kinds as possible.

Outside of club activities there was nothing John liked more than a trip out to a country pub for a bite to eat and a few pints of liquid refreshment.

The greatest tribute I can pay to John is to say that every time I worked with him he was the consummate professional.

My own memory of John is not only as a very fine film actor but also a great recruiter of cast for our films. This included over the years, stars of The Big Bang, Cabot. These contacts have provided great strength to the Society as they have given us a network in the acting community that has served us well and which continues to bear fruit. One of John's early introductions was our current Chairman

John also initiated our longstanding informal link with the SPP Theatre Group (formerly St Paul's Players), a link that has not only provided us with cast but also access to skills such as costumes and set construction.

Spotting which actor was right for a part was a particular skill of John's and he was always right. Perhaps the most interesting story about John in this respect concerns the last film he worked on in a behind the scenes role. It was 'Uncertain Proof' made by a number of BFVS members.

Being familiar with the script and knowing that casting auditions would shortly have to start John was on the lookout for suitable cast. He decided that he had found the leading man when he was served by him in an Indian restaurant. John was so confident that he had found our man that he approached the waiter and asked him if he was interested in being in a film. It turned out that the waiter had a degree in drama inn his native country. After audition he was selected for the part. As his English pronunciation needed attention John spent many hours with the actor polishing his performance.

It is a tribute to John's casting skill that from such a brief meeting he could spot talent.
